
# **Plan of the Exhibition Halls**

## Introduction from the Organiser—Chris Challis

This year's Railwells follows on from last year's extremely well received event, and of course includes Scalefour Southwest, as well as special sections for The EM gauge Society and The 2mm Association.

Of the 14 layouts attending 2 will be of stations on the Cheddar Valley Line. **Cheddar** is presented as a nearly finished layout set in the B.R. (W) period. **Wells Tucker Street Goods** built for the 150th anniversary of the Cheddar Valley Railway in 2020 — lockdown stopped this event. It shows the terminus of the line in the G.W.R. period. This part-built layout was started, to show the goods yard before the road was built on the line, The goods shed is the only building remaining today.

There will also be **Stodmarsh**, in "O" gauge, with Dads Army in attendance. At the smaller end of the scale is Brian Harrap's proto Z layout **Zobland** and **Sefton Park** by Roger Orpwood working at 3/4mm to the foot, no motors in these loco's — they work with magic!

Also attending will be 18 traders including the newly reformed Blacksmith Models and David Maidment Chairman of the Railway Children Charity.

# Blakey Rigg by Paul Green "S"Scale Stand 31

Blakey Rigg (or Ridge) was between Rosedale and Farndale and was the site of Blakey Junction high up on the North Yorkshire Moors on the Rosedale Branch of the North Eastern Railway. The branch reached the tops via an incline and was built to transport the considerable quantities of ironstone mined there and move it down to Teeside for smelting into iron and steel. The busy Junction saw branches going off to the East and West sides of Rosedale plus another branch to Farndale. On my layout in "S" scale, it is assumed that the Farndale branch brought the ironstone and potash. Together with the Rosedale ironstone, the Junction was a busy but isolated and windswept place.

The layout was featured in the December 2021 Railway Modeller and the August 2022 British Railway Modelling magazines. Please do not hesitate if you want to ask questions about the layout, prototype or "S" Scale.



#### Buntingham by Susan Stoodley "S4"Scale Stand 12

This is a very early lavout, which some of you may remember. Built in the 1970s by Raymond Hammond, it Is based very loosely on Buntingford, Hertfordshire at a time when diesels started to replace steam locomotives. It was designed to be an exhibition layout right from the start and comes in four paired baseboards that fit easily in one estate car. It is built to S4 standards. and may even be the first such layout built. Ray was a founder member of both the P4 and Scalefour Societies. He was very instrumental in the move to the more accurate track modelling that we see today. It is being exhibited at Railwells by his daughter, Susan Stoodley, who helped Ray exhibit the layout many times in the 70s, including at Central Hall in London when it was still under contruction. 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## Burnham on Sea by John Perrett 2<sup>mm</sup>FS Stand 19

Situated on the Somerset coast, this town once had importance as the Western terminus of The Somerset & Dorset Railway. It was to fulfil the railways plan, to link the Bristol channel with the English channel.

The jetty at Burnham received rails from Welsh steelworks to be carried onwards to the expanding rail network in southern England, there was also some coal traffic. Pleasure steamers would call regularly during the summer. The jetty was also used by the lifeboat. It was stored in its boathouse on its own siding and launched down the railway lines on the jetty.

The railway station, opened on the 3rd May 1858, it had one platform featuring an overall roof and opposite was a long platform built for excursion trains.

The station closed to normal passenger workings on the 29th October 1951, but excursion traffic continued to run until the 8th September 1962 and finally was closed to goods traffic on the 20th May 1963.

The model was built (to 2mm finescale standards) and was exhibited by the late Denys Brownlee. After his death the model was sold and then stored for some years. It was recently bought by the current owner and by now, unfortunately, was found to be a little worse for wear. He set about the job of rejuvenating it and most of the work has been done under the baseboards so far. Currently the work continues on tidying up the scenery and making some correct rolling stock (a big job!). It is intended to depict the S&DIR scene in the 1920's – 1930's and rolling stock is being made to show this. Current stock is mainly kit built or adapted "N" gauge.

#### **Cheddar** by Andrew Ullyott

#### Stand 32 **P4**

This layout represents the Great Western Railway station at Cheddar, in Somerset, on the Yatton, Wells to Witham branch during the post nationali-



sation period of British Railways. It was known as the Cheddar Valley branch line, or colloquially, the Strawberry Line due to the large amount of soft fruit sent out all over the country in the summer months. In addition, there were three loading points for locally quarried limestone

within the station limits, as well as through goods trains to and from Wells.



#### Wells Tucker Street Goods by Chris Challis

The layout started as a display for the 150th anniversary of the opening of the Cheddar Valley Railway from Yatton to Wells in April 2022. (Cancelled due to Covid). The only



building remaining from all of the old station is the goods shed. The goods shed model was built by Wells Railway Fraternity member Jock Ferguson 45 years ago. The layout is being built to a very simple design; the track is hand built, points are operated by ½ inch dowel under the baseboard. Ballast is from the Batts Coombe Quarry at Cheddar. Strawberry Way now runs along the old track bed up to its junction with Portway. The scene shows the line from Portway bridge on the left, to Burcott Road Railway Bridge on the right. The passenger station was beyond Burcott Road Bridge. Should you have any questions about P4 or the Cheddar Valley Railway please ask..

## Zobland by Brian Harrap


# Stodmarsh7mm GaugeStand 44by Kevin Cartwright

Construction of the line terminated at Stodmarsh due to financial pressures and a decline in both goods and passenger transport. The Southern Railway closed the line in 1940, 3 years later it was forced to reopen it to help the war effort during preparations for D-Day. It was used to transport men, munitions and machinery to the South Coast embarkation ports.

You join us on a day of total chaos! The American and British forces are on manoeuvres. The yanks are giving everyone wrong directions on the bridge and the local residents are running for cover as the Luftwaffe have dropped some incendiary bombs . The National Fire Services have managed to extinguish the grass fire caused by the incendiaries whilst the Home Guard have captured a shot down German airman. Occasionally during the melee you should see a train working in the station. A Lock-down project saw a new baseboard added and the scenery reworked. We hope you enjoy watching the layout.

#### Trerice by Jerry Clifford 4mm P4 Stand 20 and the late lain Rice

This is a Cameo model built by the late lain Rice. The layout and other elements of lain's modelling have survived, through the




good offices of Rice family members. A small group of his close friends who feel the historical importance that was lain's contribution to the hobby, especially the fine scale part of it, should be preserved, for others to enjoy. The following two paragraphs came also from the Rice pen intended for exhibition guides.

"This tiny P4 (4mm scale/18.83 mm track gauge) layout depicts a typical set of Cornish 'pan' china clay dries and their associated railway facilities as they would have been around 1960. The buildings are all models of originals in the Goss Moor area of Cornwall, and the railway is based on the Wenford Bridge branch near Bodmin.

The layout features the two locomotive types most often associated with the Wenford Bridge line, the ex-LSW Beattie 2-4-0WT and the GW '1366' class dock tanks. Both these models are largely scratchbuilt - as are all the structures, which feature hand-scribed and painted stonework. The Scenic work incorporates fragments of genuine Delabole slate waste. The china-clay (Kaolin) is also the real thing. Iain Rice October 2004"

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There was also a private siding for the Bristol Water Company's treatment works, meaning plenty of operational interest. It has taken 10 years to get this far and is being presented to the public for the first time as a work in progress, because, like many of our projects, it is not yet finished. The boards are made of ply and extruded polystyrene whilst the train shed, goods shed and signal box have all been drawn out in *Coreldraw*, then laser cut in *Rowmark* and ply by York Modelmaking before being skinned with embossed plastic sheet. All of the trackwork is hand built, Rolling stock is the usual mixture of kits and converted ready to run models, sprung wherever possible. At the time of writing, there's still much to do, but we hope you will get a flavour of this little corner of Somerset. Please feel free to ask questions, share your memories of the station or indeed the "Strawberry Line"



#### Cambrian Railway, Dinas Mawddwy by Andy Cundick

4mm/EM Stand 26

Dinas Mawddwy was the terminus of the Mawddwy Railway, which ran from Cemmes Road on the Cambrian main line north to Dinas Mawddwy. The railway opened in 1867 but was declared bankrupt in 1908. An approach to the Cambrian Railway saw it reopen in 1911 eventually being absorbed into the GWR in the grouping. The Great Western ceased passenger traffic in 1931 with final closure in 1951. The model features the line as it was around 1913 just before the Great War. It is built to EM Gauge with kit or scratch built stock.

## Leysdown by Adrian Colenut 4mm/P4 Stand 45

Of the standardgauge light railways of Kent, one of the most successful was the Sheppey Light

Contraction of the second seco	A Company and a company

Railway, conceived by the islanders in the 1890s and engineered by the wellknown Holman F. Stephens. Absorbed into the SE&CR the line underwent various improvements. Closure took place in 1950 with the last train on Saturday 2nd December. Leysdown, the terminus, was the largest station on the line and

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served the embryonic seaside resort. The layout was originally constructed back in 1996/97 by the current owner and other members of the Uckfield Model Railway Club, as the Club's first

essay into P4 modelling. The layout has a scenic area of only 12ft by 2ft. and a simple three road sector plate is used in the fiddle yard. A DCC system has been installed allowing remote operation of the locomotives, turnouts and signals and has allowed the fitting of sound chips to the



majority of locomotives enhancing operators and viewers overall enjoyment. The buildings are scratch-built using a variety of materials, principally card & plasticard. Much thought has been put into the presentation of the layout and the team are always happy to answer any questions. Further information can be found at www.leysdown.org.uk

#### "N" Gauge Stand 15 **Moorview** by Paul Holwill

Moorview is an additional station on the old ex LSWR / SR mainline which linked Exeter, Okehampton & Plymouth. The Winter weather in Devon is atrocious and Dartmoor has been hit hard by heavy snow. Storms out to sea have been hitting the sea wall on the GWR route through Dawlish and Teignmouth, making it impassible. To maintain a service and as a result of this, all of the services between Exeter and Plymouth are now running on the old Southern route. As is usual in times like this, the train



crews and permanent way gangs have made a sterling effort and are working hard to keep services running.

We will commence on Saturday morning in the mid 50s & end on Sunday afternoon in the late 80s/ early 90s.

If you are going to watch the trains go by don't forget your coat, hat, scarf and gloves.

#### Stand 22 **Pit Hill** by Mick Simpson 2 **FS** and the late lain Rice

Pit Hill is the result of a collaboration between the late Iain Rice and Mick Simpson, it has appeared at Railwells before as a "work in progress". Iain died in October 2022, his passing, as might be expected left a void and mix of emotions. To say we miss him is an understatement. This model takes inspiration from the Bowes Railway System, one of several self-acting or gravity operated railways in County Durham. On it, coal was transported from the Sunniside Marley Hill Colliery and

delivered to staithes on the River Tyne at Jarrow. The early part of the journey involved engine driven inclines, but the last leg involved a self-acting incline at Springwell. The layout seeks to portray these workings by being loosely modelled on Springwell. To reproduce this in 2mm scale presents several challenges, the light weight of the wagons, the performance properties of steel cable and how to power that cable. With the mechanical issues solved, we moved onto the scenic stage, which was to have been lain's responsibility. I pressed on and hope that I did lain proud and dressed the layout in a way of which he would have approved.



#### **By Roger Orpwood**

Although built to a tiny scale, everything in this layout is constructed as close to scale as possible. As well as the interesting challenge of working this small, the aim is to enable a

railway to be embedded in its countryside without taking up enormous



amounts of space (this 8ft long would be nearly 43ft in 4mm). To enable controlled and realistic slow running the locos are driven by an almost invisible system built into the track bed, this also allows coupling/uncoupling without any visible couplers. There is still much scenic work to complete but it is hoped the layout captures the atmosphere of a small Midland terminus around the year 1900.
